2018-2019 Course Syllabus - Mr. Carbonell



"History does not repeat itself, but it rhymes." - Mark Twain...?

The quote above has traditionally been credited to American author Mark Twain. Interestingly enough, there is no evidence that Mark Twain ever spoke or wrote these words. Even still, when a New York Times columnist published this quote and attributed it to Mark Twain in 2011 the myth stuck.

Welcome to World History! The subject that reveals a lot about who we are as a society and as individuals; the subject that shows us that while we can change the world around us, we can't always change the way people are. Throughout the year we will be diving into the known and unknown history of humanity. We will be viewing the world around us by exploring the world as it was up to 10,000 years ago. To do so we'll be studying writing, art, and sometimes even music. We'll see what experts have to say about our past and we'll debate their ideas and our own just like the experts do. In an age where a universe of information is at our fingertips, it's more important than ever to know how to discern fact from fiction and how to think critically and independently. Just because the internet said Mark Twain wrote it, doesn't mean he really did!

It's going to be an intense year of study, discussion, and reflection... but you're more than ready for the challenge!

Course Overview

The goal is to cover one unit per grading period! We will follow a modified pace to that of an AP Ancient World History class!

Grading

In accordance with school policy, grades will be divided as follows:

Homework - 15% Classwork - 25% Quizzes - 25% Tests - 35%

Quizzes: Cover a short range of topics and will rarely exceed 20 multiple choice questions. Tests: Cover a wide range of topics and will include multiple choice and short answer questions. Number of questions will vary due to combination of question types.

Important Note

There are 4 assessments (2T/2Q) scheduled for each grading period, with the exception of the third grading period which has 6 (3T/3Q). This means that 60% of your grade each period is decided by 4 (or 6) assessments; take these seriously. Extra credit will only be available in assessments.

Attendance

Falling behind in any history course can snowball into a massive load. There is simply too much information to be able to efficiently make up for large amounts of lost time. Due to this fact, attendance will be taken very seriously in this class.

- 1. You must have an excused absence or tardy in order to receive <u>full credit</u> for any missed assignments.
- 2. You will be given as many days as you missed in order to make up work. After this period is up you will be given an F in the gradebook for any missed work. No exceptions!
- 3. Per Miami-Dade County policy: Excessive tardiness and/or unexcused absences may result in loss of class credit!

It is your responsibility to check Archie for any missed homework assignments and to check in with your peers to catchup on any notes and classwork that you may have missed.

Late Work and Gradebook Errors

Per school policy, students will have only <u>one additional class</u> to turn in late work with a penalty of one letter grade. No exceptions.

If there is an error in the gradebook it is your responsibility as students to detect and attempt to get them fixed as early as possible. **Do not expect a resolution to all of your grade problems on the last week of the grading period.** Be proactive.

Classroom Procedures

- 1. Quietly be seated in assigned seat before the bell.

- 6. At the end of each class: Make sure to copy homework in your agenda and have all necessary handouts before leaving. Patiently wait for teacher to dismiss you from class. Clean up your area by picking up trash and fixing desks and chairs.

Failure to follow these procedures will result in proper disciplinary action.

Rules and Consequences

In addition, all violations of these policies will be addressed in line with school disciplinary policy.

Students who violate any rules, procedures, or policies will only receive one verbal warning. Repeat violations will result in a conduct cut in addition to school and district disciplinary measures. Receiving a conduct cut means your conduct grade drops a full letter grade.

Note: Consistently good and exemplary behavior can help repair your conduct grade back to an A as long as you have a C or better. Do not make the mistake of believing you are entitled to an opportunity to repair a bad conduct grade, the best way to have an A in conduct is to follow school rules at all times.
