Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Kids often like to help their teachers and parents. We can all help Mother Earth.

Have you heard "Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle?" You can help save the planet with these words. And the best part? You can do most of these things by yourself!

Reduce: Limit what you use every day. Turn off the faucet while you brush your teeth to save water. You can also turn the light off when you leave a room. Unplugging phone chargers will save energy, too. Turning off your computer while you are not using it will also help save power. Walk or ride a bike to visit a close friend. That will reduce pollution because someone will not be using a car to drive you somewhere.

Reuse: You can reuse things instead of throwing them away. If you make a mistake on one side of the paper, don't throw it away. Turn it over and use the back. Don't buy a book and read it once. Go to the library to get a book and return it when you are done. You can ask your friend to share a favorite game instead of asking for a new one. When you get ready for school, pack your lunch in a plastic container. That way, you can wash it, and there will be less trash. Also, look for ways to help Mother Earth by being creative! Save empty paper towel holders or water bottles and turn them into a fun art project.

Recycle: Don't throw away plastic bottles or cans. You can also collect paper, cardboard, and plastic. All of these can be recycled! Your city may pick these items up at your home and take them to a place where they can be made into new items. For example, many boxes are made out of recycled cardboard.

Another way to recycle is to use an old item as something new. For example, turn an old t-shirt into a rag for cleaning. By recycling, there will be less trash in the landfills.

You might think of more ways that you can help Mother Earth. Before you throw something away, stop. Ask yourself how you can use this again. You will probably think of some fun ideas! What will you do to help the planet today?


