As a young man, he worked as a surveyor then fought in the French and Indian War (1754-63). During the American Revolution, he led the colonial forces to victory over the British and became a national hero. In 1787, he we elected president of the convention that wrote the U.S. Constitution George Washington became America's first president two years later. He knew that future presidents would model their president after his, so he worked hard to do an honorable job.
