

# Identifying Singular and Plural Nouns

A noun that names only one person, animal, place, or thing is a **singular noun**.

A noun that names more than one person, animal, place, or thing is a **plural noun**.

Add –s to form the plural of most singular nouns.

*singular noun*

The **girl** wants to play baseball.

*plural noun*

The **girls** want to play baseball.

# Identifying Singular and Plural Nouns

Identify the blue noun as singular or plural.

# Plural Nouns with –s

Add –s to most nouns to form the plural.

*singular noun*

The **bike** has fat tires.

*plural noun*

The **bikes** have fat tires.

## Plural Nouns with *-s* and *-es*

Add *-es* to form the plural of a singular noun that ends with *s*, *x*, *ch*, or *sh*.

*add -s*  
The **players** shake hands after the game.

*add -es*  
The **coaches** teach them good sportsmanship.
