1. Chart 1 is the Italian School chart. Its focus is the Italian School of PreSocratic philosophy. In the chart, who are the last four philosophers?


4. In your answer to question #2, which are the three Italian School philosophers? (The Pythagoreans count as one philosopher: Philolaus.)


