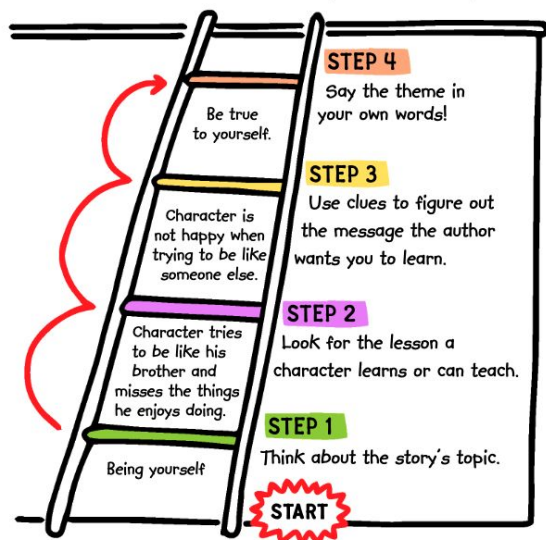

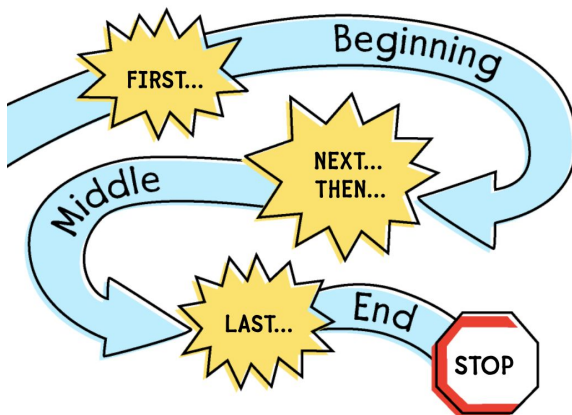
THEME

RETELL

When you retell, you describe what happens in a story in order.

Use **words and pictures**.



Author's Purpose

Why do authors write?

They have one of these purposes.

It's as easy as **PIE** to remember...



PERSUADE

The author tries to persuade readers to agree or to do something.



INFORM

The author gives facts and information about a topic.



ENTERTAIN

The author writes for readers to enjoy.

How can you figure out the author's purpose?

FIRST... look for clues about the genre.

THEN... ask questions about what you read and find answers.

Review Compound Subjects and Predicates

A **compound subject** is formed by two or more nouns that make up the subject of a sentence. The nouns are joined by the coordinating conjunction *and* or *or*.

compound subject

Movies and plays are the best!

Review Compound Subjects and Predicates

A **compound predicate** names two or more things the subject did or does. A compound predicate is also formed with a coordinating conjunction.

compound predicate

Actors **sing and dance in the show**.
