

IDENTIFY CLAIM

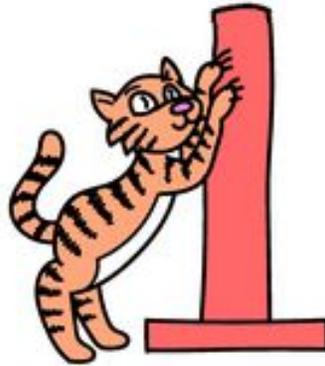


When you read an argumentative text, look for the claim.

- The claim is the position the author takes on a subject.
- The claim is the author's opinion.
- The claim is a statement the author tries to prove.
- The claim will come at the beginning of the text.
- The claim will solve a problem or answer a question.
- The author will include facts and evidence to prove the claim.

Claim

The best way to keep your cat from destroying furniture with her claws is to have a scratch post.



Evidence

After we bought a scratch post, Fluffy sharpened her claws on it instead of the couch.

Cats have the most interesting eyes of all the animals.



Cats' pupils are vertical slits instead of circles, like most animals' pupils.

Ronald McNair

When Ronald McNair was a child, he was so fond of and good with mechanical things that his nickname became "Gizmo." He continued that knack for fixing things as he grew older and showed himself to be a great student and athlete. The son of a mechanic and a teacher, Ronald went on to get a PHD from the famous and *elite* Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He became known as an expert in the field of laser technology. When he learned that NASA was looking for scientists, Dr. McNair applied. From eleven thousand applications, McNair was one of thirty-five people chosen to join the Space Program. In

1984, Ronald became the second African American in space serving as a mission specialist on a one-week Challenger mission to take a special satellite to space. His expertise with lasers was important. The mission was successful. Unfortunately, McNair's next trip to space was not. He died along with six other crew members in the 1986 Challenger explosion.

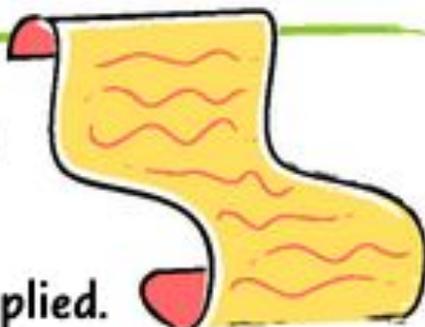
CLAIM**EVIDENCE**

THEME

The **theme** is the main message, lesson, or moral of the text.



The theme can be stated in text. Fables and myths might tell the theme at the end.



The theme can be implied. Use text clues to figure it out.

- ♥ What happens to the characters?
- ♥ How do the characters react?
- ♥ What do the characters learn?
- ♥ How do the characters grow or change?

ASK: What is the author trying to teach me?
