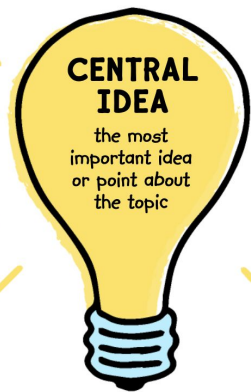
Create Mental Images

When you create mental images, you make pictures in your mind to help you remember what you read.



CENTRAL IDEA

TOPIC
the person or thing the text is about



SUPPORTING EVIDENCE
details, facts, or examples in the text that tell about the central idea



Compound Words

Compound words are made up of two smaller words. The smaller words can help you read, spell, and learn the meaning of the compound word. Use a dictionary to check if your meaning is correct.

Examples

- 1 battle + ground = **battleground**
- 2 under + side = **underside**
- 3 camp + fire = **campfire**
- 4 fish + bowl = **fishbowl**
- 5 sail + boat = **sailboat**



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Review Adjectives and Articles

An **adjective** is a word that tells more about a noun. An adjective can describe how something looks, feels, sounds, tastes, or smells. An **article** is a special kind of adjective. The articles *a* and *an* identify any kind of noun. The article *the* identifies a specific noun.

Rita and her dog played in **a noisy** park.
Nico's **brown** horse ate **an** apple.
The dolphins chewed **smelly** fish with their **pointy** teeth.
