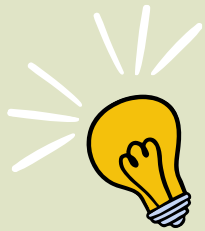

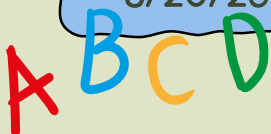

Prepositions

A **preposition** is a word that shows a connection between other words in a sentence.

Prepositional Phrases to Provide Details

A **prepositional phrase** can give more details in a sentence. A prepositional phrase can tell *where*, *when*, or *how*.

How	Penguins catch fish with their beaks.
Where	They catch them in the ocean.
When	They like to go fishing in the morning.

How: Spiders catch flies **with their webs**.

Where: There is a web **outside the back door**.

When: Spiders spin their webs **during the day**.
